

#### The Rev'd Martin Mudie writes

March sees the return of new life to both town and countryside. In the gardens not only crocus but early daffodils make a very welcome appearance foretelling the arrival of Spring.

In the Church we are also looking forward to the new life for all which is at the centre of our Easter celebration. However, before we get there for that celebration, we observe the preparation season of Lent. Now Lent is observed by people in many ways. Some deny themselves the joy which is chocolate as a mark of respect for the 40 days which Jesus spent in the wilderness prior to his ministry. Although I admire their will power, I have no intention in joining their number!

So for many years now rather than depriving myself of things I like, I try and take on something new. For some time now, my wonderful doctor has been encouraging me to do something weird called exercise, so this year I intend to go on a 10 minute speed walk every day except Sunday which is, of course, the Day of Rest! We will see how it goes.

#### Growth Mindset by Starfish Class North Curry C of E School

The local children in the younger class have been working on their attitude towards learning. It is something that we all can adopt and put into our everyday lives. How often do we give up on something when we find it too hard to do?

In your mind you have both a 'growth mindset' and a 'fixed mindset'. If you have a fixed mindset you give up easily and say "I can't do this" and "I'm not going to keep trying". In Starfish Class, our teacher encourages us to have a growth mindset where we do not give up. Our motto is 'practise makes progress'.



After the excitement of Christmas, Ash Wednesday brings us to the reflective season of Lent when we can take to heart the call to repentance and the assurance of forgiveness. Since the middle ages it has become the custom to begin Lent by being marked in ash with the sign of the cross as a sign of repentance. In North Curry we will do this at a midweek Eucharist on the evening of 6<sup>th</sup> March.

A millennium before the medieval custom of Ashing, Lent was already established as the 40 days, less Sundays, leading up to Easter. Easter was the time when new converts to Christianity were Baptised, and this period was used for their preparation and instruction. It was probably only later that Lent gained its character as a season of Fasting and Penance.

During this season, 25<sup>th</sup> March is observed as the Feast of the Annunciation (count the months) and March ends with Mothering Sunday, the fourth Sunday of Lent, a day of refreshment from the Lenten rigours. The month also includes two of our national patron saints, David and Patrick.

#### Rogationtide Walk, Sunday 26th May

In a couple of months, Revd John Tyler will again lead the walk around our benefice, visiting all the Athelney churches and asking for God's Blessing at each.

Below, is a brief outline of the day, with a more detailed presentation to follow in the May edition of the magazine.

So if you plan on joining us, maybe it is time to finely tune your limbs in preparation. Why not indulge yourself in some walks around our beautiful village in readiness of the jaunt?

8.00am	Start at North Curry Church	Emmaus Eucharist
9.00am	walk to Stoke St. Gregory	approx 3 miles
11.00am	Stoke St. Gregory Church	Short service
11.30am	walk to Burrowbridge	approx 4.25 miles
2.00pm	Arrive at Burrowbridge, Break for lu	inch
2.30pm	Burrowbridge Church	Short service
3.15pm	Burrow Mump	Blessing

Times are approximate and may have to be adjusted.

You can walk the entire route (approx 9.5 miles), or just join us on part of it. Whilst the gradient will be mostly level, some footpaths and muddy fields may be involved.

Stout walking shoes/ boots are recommended, and bring along some "emergency" refreshments, including water. Dogs welcome, but must be

#### Letter from the Right Reverend Ruth Worsley, Bishop of Taunton **Let Him look at you**



The other day, someone was speaking about visiting with her elderly mum. She was telling me that whenever she visited, she would offer to do any jobs that might be needed and beyond her mum's reach. Her mum's response was to say: "Just sit down and let me look at you". I've been thinking about that conversation ever since.

What a wonderful thing to say to your child. "Just sit down and let me look at you".

She was sharing this vignette, a year after her mum's death. There are no more opportunities for her mum to 'sit and look at her'. How glad she is that she took the time while her mum was alive.

I wonder if I can say the same. Have I made time for the things that really matter or am I so focused on the tasks at hand that I forget the need for space to develop relationships? I have a sense that this isn't just about the people who matter to me but also that it may be Jesus speaking to me as well. "Just sit down and let me look at you".

The story of Mary and Martha opening up their home to Jesus in hospitality perhaps reminds us most of the priority of spending time in the presence of Jesus. Martha complains at Mary's lack of support in helping with the household jobs. Jesus response is to suggest that Martha has become so distracted with the 'tasks' of hospitality that she has missed the point of what welcome and relationship is.

We often think of this story as being about Mary and Martha's priorities. Which is of greater significance? Our attitude of service or that of spiritual exploration? However I'm wondering if Jesus was saying something more. "Just sit down and let me look at you". What would Jesus see if He looked at you? How does He look at you?

8<sup>th</sup> March is international women's day, often an opportunity to remind us that society's way of looking at women has changed over the years. The Me Too movement has revealed some of the ways in which women have been objectified resulting in forms of abuse. Alongside that growing realisation we are increasingly aware that many women and men feel a sense of dissatisfaction with how they look and can find their mental health affected as a result. Many of us find another person looking at us, uncomfortable.

I'd like to suggest that we might hear these words, "just sit down and let me look at you", as an invitation from Jesus to spend time under his gaze this week. Not as a means of incurring shame but rather to receive the look of love that he so wants us to see.

This means that there is no guarantee that any will be left for at-the-door purchase on the night of the concert.



#### North Curry Bellringers, Darren Woodyer writes

Life in the bell tower never seems to stand still. If it's not getting the clock sorted out, after it has decided to have a funny five minutes, its teaching the children from the local school in the after-school club.

We are passionate about our bells and that said there are lots of projects on our wish list to ensure the bells are heard over the village and Moors for many years to come.

Community support and backing is vital to ensure we achieve our goals.

One project that is under way at the moment is to level the floor slightly in the tower. For those of you who have not been up into the tower, we have the traditional spiral staircase which leads up into the ringing chamber where all of the ropes are. One issue is that at the top of the stairs, there is an oak joist which protrudes approximately 2 inches above the floor, and runs the whole length of the tower. Not only is it a trip hazard, it also causes problems when ringing a couple of the bells, because one foot could be on the beam and the other on the lower floor.

A faculty application has been submitted, and the plan is to build a wooden frame on the floor and to secure a thick boarding on top. This would bring the main floor level up to the same height as the beam.

I would like to take this opportunity to welcome new ringer Roger Edwards and his family to the village, and also thank him for his help so far with the ringing. I have heard rumours that there are other people in the village that would like to come and have a go, please do, we don't bite!

Even if you just want to come and see what all the racket is about, you can pop

up to the tower on a Monday evening or you can give me a ring to have a chat about it first.

#### A View from the Treasurer's Tower, Rob Ellis reports

Last Month, I put in a detailed report of our accounts. Just to see if anyone was actually reading it, I definitely (ohh no you didn't haha!) printed some erroneous 2017 comparative figures. As no one commented... is there anyone actually reading this I wonder? Anyho, below are the revised table of overheads, with 2017 showing the corrected figures.

As you are aware, I am continually striving to bring down the yearly overhead costs, but they are still working out at around £658 per week (which is around £95 per day). Whilst I may be able to get the costs down a bit more here and there, I suggest £658 should be considered our baseline costs. Our giving and fund raising

need to cover this per week to keep us solvent, which I believe is achievable with our committed and generous members.

As a note to the Parish Share (Diocese cost), which is our largest overhead (as it would be for most churches), I am confident of reducing our 2019 Share by over £6,000 (perhaps even more) from 2018. We (the wardens and I) met the Diocese Funding Committee Chairman in Wells during February to plead our case for a significant reduction. We felt our reasoning was well received, but as negotiations are continuing, I have no definitive confirmation as yet. I will update you all in the next report. I certainly have no intention of paying their demand for £21,757.

As for moving forward, as at the end of February, we were still on track for a small surplus by the end of the year.

Our work on the new fence (reported last issue) has saved us a bob or three from what we had anticipated. As such, we would like to receive your suggestions on how to spend our grant money around the church, to make it more enjoyable for you. As an example, we are considering pew cushions or some comfortable chairs by the coffee table. As we have just got ourselves back on track, I am not suggesting a wholesale revamp, but anything you might like seen done at the church, please let me know so it can be discussed by the PCC.

That way, we can start to plan ahead with our "wish lists", to improve our experience of visiting God's house.

And lastly, I was heartened by a letter received from a visitor. Not having any money at the time, they took a magazine, but forwarded in the post a covering letter and donation. Many probably would have not bothered, but it goes to prove the spirit of honesty and integrity still remain.

With spring now close, maybe it is time again for those strolls along the beach, so the tide time table is back!

As before, only the high tides are listed; low tides are roughly half way between each time slot.

North and south coast times are approx the same, though the table for Watchet is used as a guide.

A recent unfortunate accident to one of our volunteers who was working alone has exemplified the need for us to review our Health and Safety procedures at the church.

#### **General Statement of Policy**

Our policy is to ensure, so far as is reasonably practicable, that our activities are carried out safely and do not pose a risk to the health of our volunteers, visitors, congregation, and others who may use the church and churchyard. This will be in accordance with good practice and any relevant statutory provisions where they apply.

#### **Personal Responsibility**

It is the duty of each and every person using or visiting the church and churchyard to exercise personal responsibility for their own safety and that of others.

#### **Specific Considerations**

It is anticipated that a fully revised policy will be adopted at the next PCC meeting. Meanwhile in addition to exercising personal responsibility it is essential that:

- Anyone using a ladder or reaching high places is accompanied.
- Ideally "lone working" will be kept to a minimum. Any lone workers
  must have an operating mobile phone on their person and ensure
  that someone knows where they are and that they have returned
  safely. No one should enter the cellar (boiler room) or bell chamber
  (above the ringing chamber) or onto any church roof unless
  accompanied.
- No easily combustible materials or sources of ignition may be left unattended in the church.
- Those who close the church must check diligently that there is no one left in the church.

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#### **North Curry Church**

Is part of the Benefice of Athelney, along with the parishes of Stoke St. Gregory, Lyng and Burrowbridge – the Parish Church is frequently referred to as 'The Cathedral of the Moors', and from the River Tone valley it is easy to understand why. It was built on a site of an earlier Norman church in about 1300 in the Decorated style, using Ham Hill stone, blue lias stone, and some grey sandstone from a quarry within the parish. About a hundred years later it was updated in the Perpendicular style when the roofs of the nave and aisles were raised to accommodate larger windows. Evidences of the original pitches can be seen both outside on the south and east faces of the tower, and inside on its west arch. At this time the upper stage of the tower and the parapets were added, as was the interesting collection of gargoyles and hunkypunks.

The North Curry Parish Registers of Baptisms, Marriages and Burials date from 1539 and are almost complete.

The churchyard, just over two acres, is in two parts, with the lower 'new' part has been in use since 1952. The upper 'old' part has gravestones that are centuries old, and includes war memorials. A plan of the graves, complete with the names of the occupants, can be found in the church porch. This is a place of solace and tranquillity, with seating on the north (far) side affording magnificent views across the River Tone to yonder hills in all directions. In springtime, the natural beauty is never more apparent, when the flora carpets amongst the headstones and trees.

#### Weddings, Baptisms and Funerals

If you are interested in getting married, having a church blessing for a civil marriage or organising a baptism or funeral please contact the vicar, or one of the churchwardens.

The statutory fees are set by the Church of England and a fee list is displayed in the church porch, or is available online from: www.churchofenaland.ora.

Additional local fees may be due in accordance with the services required. At the time of your enquiry, all fee options will be explained.

There are also regulations governing the condition of the churchyard and graves, designed to ensure it remains a special peaceful place. Again, a copy is available in the church porch.

#### Hiring the Church

Our church is available for hire, for events such as concerts, talks and exhibitions for which we make a reasonable charge. Contact David Walker should you wish to know more on fees and availability.

#### Will Planning and Legacies

Having a Will in place, for when the time comes, is strongly recommended for all individuals, to ensure your final wishes are clearly laid out to friends and family. To supplement your planning, the church has developed a checklist leaflet, "Final Wishes", which is in no way a will, but designed to help those left behind with your instructions and administration of your estate. This leaflet will be available in the church literature section.

#### **Planned Giving and Donations**

Planned Giving, by standing order, is a regular charitable payment (or pledge) to the church. This type of giving is an important and integral aspect of our finances, as the majority of our income comes through the planned giving scheme.

Donation pledges by standing order are easier to administer, both for you and us. Regular planned giving can also attract tax gift aid, enabling us to boost your donation by 25%. Donations can be given monthly, quarterly, or yearly, and the amount is very much up to you. You are not beholden once started, and can be cancelled at anytime. Please contact our Treasurer, Rob Ellis 01823 490599, for the appropriate forms to complete, or to discuss your giving pleage. Standing order mandates are not the same as direct debit mandates. The amounts and dates are fixed, and the instruction to your bank is completely controlled by you.
